Ornithological Snippets



On 20th July at Allan's Beach Janet Ledingham found another **Variable Oystercatcher** family comprising 2 all black birds and a pied one, with one of the adults being banded.

Tom Waterhouse reports that there were 5 **Great Crested Grebe** at Katiki Reservoir on 10th August, all adults.

The **Black-billed Gulls** in Balclutha were starting to occupy their colony from the first week in August, with about 400 birds present. There are also several hundred **Red-billed Gulls** in the area, so it will be interesting to see how many stay to breed this year.

Suzanne Schofield counted 79 **NZ Pigeons** at Kaitangata on 12th August – they were feeding on willow buds by river over a stretch of 1-200m.

Jane Forsyth saw and photographed an abnormal **Silvereye** at Lake Hawea township on 20th July. It had an elongated upper mandible and anomalous coloration, but was associating with normal birds.



Finally on 25th July the Otago Daily Times reported massed gatherings of **Starlings** at Shiel Hill, Dunedin.

Don't forget Special eBird talk



We are pleased to welcome members of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology to Dunedin. They are visiting here for a large international conference on databases of biodiversity being held at the Museum. They generously offered to speak to us and help us get up-to-date on the features of eBird. So we have scheduled an extra Special Indoor Meeting on Wed 29th August at 7.30pm in the Benham Seminar Room. The team members will speak on “The eBird Enterprise - Engaging the Global Birding Community for Science, Conservation, and Fun.”

Hope a goodly number of you can make it (it's the 5th Wed of the month so shouldn't clash).

We use eBird mainly to record our own bird sightings and data from our projects, and as a consequence of this eBird collects vast amounts of data that can be used for science and conservation. eBird can generate graphs, maps, and detailed analysis tools to help scientists better understand patterns of bird occurrence and the environmental and human factors that influence them.

Steve Kelling and Jessie Barry have always had a personal interest in birds and bird watching, and their careers have lead them to develop Internet applications that engage bird-watchers in citizen science projects focused on birds. Steve is head of the eBird team at Cornell Lab of Ornithology that is, among other things, developing unique computer science strategies

to analyze the distribution and abundance of wild bird populations. Jessie is Program Manager for the Macaulay Library section of eBird and looks after audio collections and the smart phone ID interface, Merlin.

EBird news

Taxonomic Update

Anyone who has used or visited eBird in the last few days (hopefully everyone!) will have noticed a few changes, mainly in the species order. Once a year a taxonomic update takes place in eBird – usually this is relatively minor, involving species which have been “lumped” or “split. This may mean your list totals vary slightly, especially if you have travelled widely. This year has also seen some significant changes to the taxonomic sequence, so for example gulls and pigeons have been brought forward, while herons and raptors have moved further down the list. There may be some discrepancies in the short term, while the changes bed in (one or two of us have inadvertently seen Mallard/Mexican Duck!), but these should sort themselves out soon, so don’t panic! **Richard Schofield**
