This wader count was carried out in rather unpleasant conditions. A few showers at the start, partly cloudy later on with a very strong southerly. Very tiring. Unfortunately we had not enough backup counters this time and as a consequence Papanui Inlet was not covered. Hopefully future

wader counts will not have this problem. Godwits were down 500 on last year, possibly due to the lack of coverage or the weather. Richard Schofield was once again the lucky one with a couple of rarities - Red-necked Stint, the 2nd for the Catlins and a Terek Sandpiper, the first for the Catlins and Otago. Two Knot returned to Hooper's Inlet.

Ornithological Snippets

Lesley Gowans, Sue Galloway and Mary Thompson travelled to Manapouri at Labour weekend. On the 24th October between Gore and Mossburn we checked out rivers on the way for **Black-billed Gull** colonies. At least 5 colonies were found. The first on the Mataura just out of Gore – 400+; Oreti at Lumsden bridge -1500+; Oreti at Mossburn bridge -1500+; Mararoa 100+ and evidence of 2 others on Oreti but which couldn't be seen from the road. The gulls were incubating eggs and there was no evidence of chicks yet. **Black-fronted terns** were nearby the large colonies but did not appear to be nesting yet.

Audrey Eagle reported that on 23rd October her daughter saw a **NZ Falcon** flying around Chain Hills Road – the first they have seen in this area.



As well as the 2 "regular" Hooper's Inlet birds seen in the wader count there was a single **Lesser Knot** amongst the godwits at Aramoana on 31 October. Photo by Jason Wilder.

The colour banded godwit appears to be one that was banded at Warrington Spit in 2007 and has been seen several times since at Aramoana or Warrington.

In addition to the **Terek Sandpiper** in the Catlins, there have been a couple of other rarer birds in the area this month. Bruce McKinlay found "*what looks to me like an **intermediate egret***" at Tomahawk Lagoon on the evening of 7 November. A check the following day failed to find it but ever optimistic, he thought it might be back. Jason Wilder checked the lagoon on the 9th and found instead a **White-winged Black Tern**.

Returning the following day, he failed to see the tern but found and photographed what he was sure was a **White Heron**.



He was quick to add that is "*not to say that it's the same as the individual in the (Bruce's) eBird report!*"

The tern stayed around until at least the 16th.

Intermediate Egret

For anyone tempted to look out for Intermediate Egrets here are a few comparative photos. White Heron left, Intermediate right

Not surprisingly Intermediate Egrets are quite a bit bigger than Cattle or Little Egrets and considerably smaller than White Herons. They have a shorter neck that lacks the obvious kink often seen in White Heron and a rounder head not unlike a Cattle Egret.

Close up, the gape of a White Heron extends back past the eye while that of Intermediate ends level with the eye.

A word of warning however. Apparently the Australian White Herons that turned up in New Zealand last year - there were 7 at one time at Tomahawk Lagoon - are smaller than the New Zealand ones that breed at Okarito. So much so, that some New Zealand birders sent photos of the Lake Ellesmere 2013 birds to Australia wondering whether they might in fact be Intermediate Egrets. Not so said the Aussies. I've not heard how disappointed the more ardent listers were.



Programme for 2015

Red-billed Gull Colony National Survey: volunteer coordinator needed

Birds NZ is undertaking a nationwide survey over the next 2 breeding seasons of red-billed gull colonies, with the aim of answering if numbers have declined overall, and/or if redistribution of the population is occurring, and to determine the sizes of colonies. The basic proposal has two parts. First, a scoping survey, to be carried out during this year's breeding season, between October 2014 and January 2015, aimed at locating all current red-billed gull colonies. At this stage we are concerned with determining the location of these colonies, with only a rough estimate of the numbers of pairs. Determining the size of these colonies forms the second part of this proposal to be undertaken in 2015/16 season.

The information from this survey will allow the Department of Conservation to evaluate more precisely the specie's conservation status.

At present, the red-billed gull is classified as Nationally Vulnerable, based on a predicted decline of 50–70% over three generations despite an apparently large population of 20 000–100 000 mature individuals.

Lyndon Perriman and Chris L alas have recently published a study of red-billed gull colonies in the Otago region (*Notornis* 59: 138–147 2012); this means our knowledge of the colonies in Otago is very up-to-date and little probably needs to be done this 2014/15 season. However, we would like to confirm the presence of colonies and approximate size at these sites and look for any additional ones. These need to be entered in the national database.

Mary would be very pleased to hear from someone willing to plan and coordinate this survey in our region, plan the logistics for counting breeding pairs in the 2015/16 breeding season, maintain the database and liaise with DoC and the Birds NZ National Coordinators.

Black-billed Gull Colony Survey.

Rachel McClellan is proposing a 3 year aerial survey of rivers throughout the South Island, to photograph and count black-billed gull colonies. So far funding has been obtained for Canterbury Rivers and hopefully funds will eventuate for Otago and Southland Rivers. Rachel is looking for volunteers to fly over (I imagine as passenger) and photograph colonies and count birds in the photos. If anyone is interested please let Mary know (464 0787) in first instance to get further information.
